A Christmas Replection

On Christmas Day, we celebrate together with family and friends a special occasion which is enacted by the offering of presents to one another.

Today, as we reflect on the Christmas story, let us consider the meaning of giving to one another. Presents or gifts have the power to bring such joy and show how much we value another. Sometimes, when someone has very little, even a small gift can be so meaningful.

The reading from Matthew 2 tells the story of Mary and Joseph and baby Jesus, who were sought out by three Wise Men from another land with a gift offering. Mary and Joseph were young, disadvantaged. They were misunderstood by their community because of the news of the child before marriage. However, God had sent an Angel to tell them both that this child was to be Christ, the Messiah. At the time of the baby's arrival, they were required to travel for a census and were caught without a place for the birth. There was no room in any house for them but they were offered a stable where the baby Jesus was born.

When the Wise men came to bring gifts, this was a sign from the Divine God that He was providing for this young family. As the child grew up, Jesus became known for his kind acts towards the needy and his love for those most rejected by others. Jesus Christ began his life receiving presents from strangers, and at the end of his life, he became a gift to the world.

"For this is how much God loved the world – he gave his uniquely conceived Son as a gift." John 3:16



On Saturday 21st October 2017 we saw a group of lay Marists gather in the crypt of St Patrick's cathedral in the city to share in the reflection day ably presented by one of our leaders, Andrew Dumas.

The day was entitled "Awaken" and all were invited to Awaken to the possibilities and opportunities we have to do things differently, to be witnesses and wake up the world.

We were asked to reflect on the picture of the Annunciation by Fra Angelico – to ponder how Mary inspires us, how she was "awakened" in the picture and how Mary's life can shape us.



Another session looked at the parables of Jesus, and the way their simple language was used to awaken us to the mystery of God and life.

We also looked at Mary as the first disciple, the Good Mother, sharing her spirituality with the world.

For our final reflection, we were asked to look at some beautiful images of hands, to choose one and then to share how that picture spoke to us. The hands were seen as symbols of community, comfort, support and love with no words needed to convey their message.

In each session we had time to hear Andrew's input, read and reflect on the resources he provided and then to share – first with our neighbour and then with the larger group.

Andrew's thoughtful presentation and beautiful handouts gave us much to think about and the messages and times of sharing left us all feeling refreshed, Awakened, and ready to face our hectic lives.

The Marist Thread Continues....

For yet another year, Marist laity continue to support a group of some 80 Aboriginal people from the Mt Druitt area, a suburb of Sydney. They belong to the <u>Baabayn Aboriginal</u> <u>Corporation</u> founded by 5 Aboriginal Elders from Western Sydney. (www.baabayn.org.au)



Their purpose is to connect with individuals and families in a welcoming environment, providing them with supports and links to services that help them heal from the past and nurture their sense of confidence and pride in the future.

Each year in November, they look forward to staying in Gerringong for a weekend to rest, play and absorb the natural beauty of the South Coast of NSW.

For the past 24 years, the Friday evening meal has been prepared by a small group of Marists: Maryanne Knoblanche, and Cecelia and Michael Brungs. They belong to the Hunters Hill parish led by Fr Kevin Bates SM. This year they were helped by Marist Brothers Lawrie McCane from Australia, Brother Jonnel Sisneros from the Philippines and a young lay Marist couple, both teachers from Mexico, Argelia Hernandez Mendoza and Roderigo Gris Castro. These 4 Marists live together in a new community in Mt Druitt. They have responded to a call from the Marist Brothers' Superior General, Brother Emili Turu to create International Communities for a New Beginning. Rodrigo explains:



"Our place at Mount Druitt is located 45km west of Sydney CBD, New South Wales, Australia. Our suburb has been identified as the most disadvantaged area of Sydney. It is also the most culturally diverse and has the highest population density of indigenous people in the country. Unemployment, family violence, crime, homelessness and drug use are an issue. Many children are disengaged from schooling. Some are of indigenous background, or refugee children from Africa or the Middle East.

We will be targeting young people who are not at school by establishing a new pathway for disengaged youth to re-connect with education, other forms of training or employment. In partnership with Local Catholic Education Authorities we aim to begin a centre, Marist Learning Zone, where each young person will be given fresh educational opportunities, and the hope of a more promising future.

We pray that Mary will accompany us in this project and, at her side, we will be confirmed in our shared vocation, contributing to the creation of a better society, in which the weak and the marginalised are valued and loved. We will be working for three years. Our mission MLZ Marist Learning Zone is a cooperative learning program partnership between Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) and the Mount Druitt Lavalla200> community. MLZ is not a school but offers a temporary re-location for young people enrolled in a CEDP school who have disengaged from their education. It connects them back into their learning, building skills in communication, collaboration and general life readiness. It prepares young people to reengage with learning in pathways that suit their needs. MLZ is offered at no cost to participants Marist Learning Zone

Back to our Baabayn friends! For the past 4 years, the Saturday evening BBQ has been organised by the local Catholic Social Justice group, of which I am a member.

And this year was no different! On the menu were Wagyu beef sausages, eggs donated by a local farmer, food donated by local IGA and a Woolies gift voucher as well as generous donations from local parishioners of Ss Peter and Paul Parish, Kiama.

As Marists, we feel privileged to be part of the Baabayn group through a ministry of hospitality and friendship and our Aboriginal brothers and sisters send a resounding THANK YOU to all who helped make their stay so enjoyable
