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Education Programmes



my father's salary is not enough to support my younger brother and sister

My father works as a mason and mother doesn't work because the factory which she worked before closed two years ago.

One of my younger sisters doesn't go to school and cannot go to work because she is ill. Also another of my younger sister and brother cannot go to school because my father's salary is not enough to support them. I am lucky because my school supports me for my education so that I can go to school.

My father always asks me to leave school so that I can work because of our family financial problems. He said I am the oldest daughter so I need to work for my family and younger siblings. I am very sad and stressful but I cannot do anything. My mother wants me to finish school and she encourages me when I am sad. My mother asks my father to allow me to go to school. Therefore, I can attend school.

Preschool Programme



75 children attended preschool programme
100% of children completing Kindergarten class began primary school
Staff visited 25 of the most in need families to develop relationship and understand their situation
23 children / families receive sponsorship to help with tuition and transport costs to come to school.
100% satisfaction report of preschool parents with transport and safety (transport is one of the biggest challenges to overcome to help children get to school)
High parent attendance 61% and 91% for meetings / activities
New electronic classroom resources introduced to help children with english and maths learning

Secondary Education Programme



85 Burmese Migrant Teenagers in 4 year Education Programme
Surveyed 41 families and 6 focus groups in the Burmese Migrant Community to understand education needs of the community for strategic planning
79 parents attended Mothers Day Celebration
Electronic Classroom 25 computers and introduction of electronic reading resources
10 graduates of BMSP programme are teachers in Local Burmese Migrant Learning Centres
Created 'Ranong Migrant Education Network' with 4 other Learning Centres
Hosted National and Local Government leaders for consultation about Burmese Migrants and Education
21 children / families received sponsorship to help with tuition and transport costs to come to school.

University Online Diploma Programme



Increased numbers of students studying ACU online Diploma from 9 to 12 students
7 of 8 courses completed successfully with graduation planned for May 2017.
Signed 5 year partnership agreement with Australian Catholic University to provide University Online Diploma for Burmese Migrants

Sometimes I think my life is not enjoyable. When I think again there are many young people who do not have opportunities to attend school. My father wanted myself and my sister to leave school and work but my mother supports us to study. I feel sad when I see them tired everyday.

Health Programmes



I felt so alone and unaccepted by my children

I am 62 years old, but I was 57 years old when I came to know I was HIV positive. My CD4 count was very low, only 55, and I was not in good health with many infections, diarrhoea and high fever. Marist Asia Health team found me and supported me with half my medication treatment. I went to hospital many times. I felt alone and unaccepted by my own children. The health team helped me to get well again and go back to work. I donate my time and food and offer to help them now. I welcome them to my house each year to say thank you. I refer others with HIV to them and I help care for dying patients in my neighbourhood. I share with my neighbours that I cannot give HIV to them. After a long struggle I am now well enough and my daughters accept me and visit me. I am a faithful Buddhist and I always pray for the Health Team. Because of them I know I can face whatever challenges happen in my life. Thank You.

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HIV AIDS Health Programme

1,392 Home Visits
2,154 translation appointments in hospital to help Doctors and Nurses understand Burmese patients
Average of 7 patients each month receive rental or financial assistance
343 nutrition food packs delivered
74% of patients are now working and supporting their families
4 patients were helped to die with dignity and respect
71 patients helped to get Health Cards to receive ARV treatment
12 new patients were referred to Marist Asia Foundation from our HIV patients



Monthly Self Help Meeting

10 'monthly' workshops helped patients gather together for education and support. Average monthly attendance 41
100% of patients said self help meetings helped them with spiritual and emotional support
monthly meetings also include Children's workshops using art and music and discussion



Health Education Programme

8 Health Topics include Attitudes, Stigma & Discrimination, What is HIV AIDS, Transmission & Prevention HIV Testing, Relationships Love and Romance in Adolescence.
15 students (15-17yrs) covered the Health Course and passed with average mark of 79
Positive results are friends and parents of students participating in support and help of HIV Patients.

Migrant Support Programmes



I felt so afraid and embarrassed to try and talk with my boss

I am a migrant worker in one of the big fish factories in Ranong. Sometimes I want to learn more for my future but I cannot talk with my Thai Boss. When I try and ask anything from my Thai Boss I feel embarrassed because I cannot respond. It is very difficult for Burmese Migrants living in Thailand not knowing how to communicate. Now I am happy I have found a Thai and Computer course at Marist Asia Foundation called Better Future for Burmese (BFFB) programme. I am getting better in Thai language and it helps me in my work to write down in Thai and communicate with Thai people. I am now more confident to achieve my dreams. We are lucky to have these classes as these programmes can help Burmese migrant workers get better work conditions, achieve their dreams and support their communities.

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Better Futures For Burmese Migrants

University Online Diploma Programme students conducted needs assessment surveys in their community and listened to needs of Young Burmese Migrant Workers. They now volunteer to provide Thai Language Class for 50 migrant workers 5 month programme
Basic Computer skills for 50 migrant workers 5 month programme



Intermediate & Academic English Programme

English Language learning provides migrant workers with more job opportunities as the ASEAN community increasingly uses English as the language of communication between ASEAN countries. 28 migrant workers completed 6 month Intermediate English Programme

15 students completing the 6 month Academic English Programme

Marist Asia Foundation entered partnership agreement with Thabyay Foundation and Exam Preparation Outreach Programme (EPOP) for online learning platform for English Learning.



Saturday School for Children without a School.

University Online Diploma Students researched in the local area and found many children in nearby charcoal and fish factories who did not attend school.

Average weekly attendance at Saturday school of 25 children

Basic Burmese Language Learning and Maths along with helping students to sit at a desk, listen to the teacher, cooperate with other students and supportive conversations with parents help children start at a Burmese Learning Centre.
