



MMC AMCOA Partnerships prioritise Women and Children in small Communities within Asia-Pacific affected by Social, Mental and Physical Disadvantage, Poverty and Natural Disaster



Dear Friends and Marist Benefactors,

A very happy and blessed Christmas. In early November, I wobbled across planks (photo below) 10' above putrid water and plastic trash with two Marist novices. At 70, I was happy to have them with me extending a steadying hand. Pointed words of Pope Francis echoed in my ears: **"You can't speak of poverty in the abstract: that doesn't exist. Poverty is the flesh of the poor Jesus, in that child who is hungry, in the one who is sick, in unjust social structures".** 

Christmas celebrates that hidden presence of 'Emmanuel'. The 'lost, the last, the little, the least' with whom the babe of Bethlehem identifies are given hope by the dedication of Marist Sisters, Brothers, Laity and Priests supported by your prayer and your wonderful warm generosity. On behalf of all our Marists on the front lines of Mission, "Thanks".

One of the Novices remarked that he had not seen such poverty in Africa. Most people living within a kilometre of this appalling dump for the 'disposable ones' from last year's fire, would also have never seen this poverty. ### **REALITY CHECK MARIST RANONG (MMR)**



#### **EDUCATION**

Pre-school Program - 75 Burmese Children in a safe environment while parents work. Students are poor - struggle to pay fees.

Child Protection Program. (15 children) 90% of Burmese Migrant worker children leave education by 12 years of age. At this crucial turning point, CCP encouraged 15 students who had left education to return to school rather than the vulnerability and despair of the streets and a bleak future.

Priority is for those with greatest needs from poorest families committed to the programs.

Secondary Education & Training (95 children) With only 20% of Burmese Migrant Children at a learning Centre and 90% of these leave age 12, Marist Burmese Secondary Education responds to a crucial need to give a chance for education leading to a brighter future.

ACU Online Learning Program (24 students) MMR Partnership with Australian Catholic University talented young Burmese have the chance to begin the journey to be teachers, health and community leaders in their places.

#### **HIC/Aids Health Project**

70 of the most abandoned HIV patients and their families - lives are lifted up.


Two Questions challenge MMR given that all programs are basically all overseas-funded.

Succession/future financial sustainability ? Sustaining the Marist ethos in programs ?

The bottom line: MMC would like to renew its support until 2016. This will assist our Marists counter the danger that vulnerable children become once again disposable victims 'in a system pressured to be efficient at all costs'. Cost is a reality check but only one of them.

MMC would like to commit \$75,000 for both 2015 & again for 2016. Can we help?

Pope Francis again: "we must embrace with tenderness the poorest, the weakest and the least important". Migrant Children and their families truly qualify!

## MARIST TEAMS among 'the lost, the last, the little and the least'





#### RNDM (OUR LADY OF THE MISSIONS) SISTERS WHERE HUMAN NEEDS ARE GREAT

Our Lady of the Mission Sisters (RNDM) work in partnership with the Marist Asia Team in Ranong, Thailand, on the Thai-Burma border. The RNDM Sisters also trace their origins to the Chapel of Fourviere in Lyons, the same spot where 12 young French seminarians made a promise to found the Marists 198 years ago. RNDM's are akin to cousins in our religious family - our founders knew each other.

Today, Sisters Margaret & Josephine work closely with the Marists in Ranong in Education and HIV/Aids Programs. As one Father observed, "Being Burmese, their love, smiles, joy and care for their own people in such difficult circumstances on the Thaiside of the border makes an incredible difference." RNDM Sisters also run a low-key anti-trafficking project (livelihood skills) for Burmese girls who could be lured into prostitution in Thailand.

**DENTISTS DELIGHT** at Marist Street Boys Centre, Davao City) From plastic chairs & room lamps to a real dental surgery at the Marist street boys centre, Davao. This is incorporated into part of new extensions sponsored by MMC.

Donated equipment enables Marist Sister Sheila (a dentist) to offer free clinics for urban poor kids and mothers. The poor rarely visit dentists or doctor negatively affecting their health. Offers of dental instruments/equipment gratefully welcomed!

Fr Lionel Mechavez SM sees out-reach programs onto the streets as an important development and medical and dental clinics are part of this initiative of getting their feet dirty.



MMC will sponsor Sister's stipend and some medical overheads.

#### **DISPOSABLE VICTIMS**

Marist Sister Monica SM, accompanied by Marist Novices from the International Novitiate in Davao, Philippines, (Guy from Africa and Soane Oceania) at a relocated evacuation site for poor Badjao families.

Their previous site, where the Sisters had a small centre for children to prepare them for school, was terrible and the fire that dislocated several thousand was a blessing (no one died). This latest effort relocating them is inhumane, appalling.

As of last month, no 'space' is available for Sister to re-establish a simple centre which MMC will assist. A young family generously share their little space with the Sisters and around 20 children.

MMC will support for Sr Monica and team to retain a presence in this terrible place, journeying with these disposable people (certainly the little and the least!).

Bishop Bosco & Engineers

Funds for renovation were totally consumed in undertaking the first restoration destroyed by fire a few months later. 18 months on, Marist Bishop Bosco desperately needs accommodation for teachers from the many islands of Vanuatu. All materials are imported so costs are high. Plans are finished to typhoon-proof standards. MMC will co-fund this vital project . \$100,000



# SOON TO FINISH ... Extension of safe haven for street boys - Davao, Philippines



The Balay Pasilungan Street Boys Program saw the need for a quasi half-way house for kids still on the streets and not yet ready to either go home, if there is one, nor to return to school. The new extension attached to the main centre meets a new need as part of its new child-protection outreach from the main program. MMC sponsored construction \$80,000

#### FINISHED ... and operating successfully

**Sister Teresia SMSM** from Fiji, now missioned in Jamaica, inspired MMC Advisory members, Geoff Henry and Richard Dynon with the stark challenges facing Sisters working with women and girls.

Drugs, guns, prostitution, domestic violence are endemic. Sister is part of a very practical project, training women to work in protected environments of the tourist resorts and co-sponsored financially by the resorts. Cost \$20,000
