



Dear Confreres

At the beginning of August, I sent to all confreres of the Province a paper entitled, RECONFIGURATION IS BACK ... The purpose of the paper was to animate some discussion among the members of our Province on the important matter of our future structures in the Society. So far, except for the couple of confreres who have offered a personal "thanks for writing it" comment, the paper has generated very little discussion.

It has only been a short space of time, so I see no problem that there has been little reaction so far, but we should be alarmed if by early 2015 we are not hearing many voices of support and opposition from around the traps and the debate heats up.

We are older and quite naturally, having lost some of our passion, must expect that we will be more subdued in all sorts of areas of our life, but we must not become so passive and unwilling to get involved that something we may not favour can slip under our guard.

Using our voice

We cannot allow the comment that we will get 'reconfiguration by stealth' to have any validity. We must all help determine our future by using our voice.

Our Province has never been a group where trying to get in the backseat and avoid the action has been the norm.

We are no different today than twenty and more years ago when we were prepared to have a go at any challenge that came our way.

But today, because of our situation, we have to be realistic about what individually and as a group we are able to achieve.

Things from the past

A week or two back, one morning when I was enjoying some minutes of quiet time before the hustle and bustle of the day took over, I was aware that I had spent quite some time engrossed in things from the past. I was remembering older confreres - including blokes now struggling with age and health issues, and also some who had died in recent years - as they were in their heyday. It was a positive reflection.

I recalled there were some confreres who have brought us shame but mostly I was recalling lives of great

men. Apart from my own memories I recalled stories told about them.

To sit quietly and pray

Some of them we have referred to as "the giants", but if we reflect a tad on our Marist history in this land, that group is not such a small group, it is huge containing many confreres. It is a great exercise to sit quietly and pray for our brothers. It is guaranteed to give one an uplifting feeling of tremendous gratitude to God.

Yes, we can be proud of our group. Harry Moore is well remembered for a line he said of another Marist province when he told them they were "a bunch of very talented blokes doing sweet-bugger-all". That is a good measure of whether you



are cutting it or not. There are certainly times in some sub-groups of our Province when this could have been said of us and we would have to own it, but for the most part it would have been rare that it was said of us.

The list could go on

Mostly we have been judged very well. We ran good schools, our parishioners noted something distinctive about us and were pleased to have us as their parish clergy, Aquinas Academy and CTU did fantastic jobs, St Pat's..... The list could go on.

It would be a terrible situation if we had to admit of ourselves that Harry's comment could in any sense apply to us today. We have to keep working at being good Marists.

Marist brand appreciated

In many, if not most cases, we Marists are remembered because we have been part of the group mis-sioning together. Our Marist brand is usually seen and appreciated when we are in corporate works. Without devaluing the great mission done by men in individual apostolates, all of us, still involved in part-time or full-time ministry, need to be encouraged to see if we are in any way able to do 'our thing' within the team context.

Some confreres in the past certainly had bad experiences living in big teams, such as colleges, where they felt they were not able to blossom. When we were hit by a movement



towards individualism that infected our Province a couple of decades ago, a number of confreres went out on their own.

Uncertain time, new beginnings

It isn't always easy to live and work with others but as we come into this uncertain time and new beginnings I encourage us to give it a go, and see if we can work and live more in groups.

We don't have to get trapped into living and working spaces that are going to stifle us. Let us see if we cannot give-and-take a bit more with others whom we want to live and work with.




News

Provincial Retreat, Mittagong, 7-12 September. Twelve confreres have booked for this retreat which will be led by Br Bob O'Connor fms. A second Provincial retreat, based at Maryvale/Montbel, is scheduled for 28 Sep until 3 Oct. About 5 or 6 non-Maryvale/Montbel residents have signed up for this retreat, and each should have received an acknowledgement and confirmation by now.

Paul Pidcock Performing Arts Centre: Paul Pidcock's contribution to music and drama at St John's College, Lismore, is receiving appropriate recognition in the naming of the new Performing Arts Centre. The official opening will occur on Friday 10 Oct. The new building is built on the site of an earlier building which housed the college bakery in the 1950s, and the foyer of the new building will feature a period photo of Br Brendan O'Connell hard at work producing the daily bread, and a re-creation of the original brick oven. It's often said that bakers jealously guard their bread recipes, and only share them on a knead-to-know basis.



The St Patrick's Ministry Committee was established earlier in the year, along with parallel committees to look at The Marist Mission Centre, and the Hunters Hill site. The three committees are a follow-up to the last Chapter designating these areas as Province priorities. Enclosed is a report from the St Patrick's Committee with details of how it is presently proceeding.

Spirituality & Lifestyle Programme: The final S&L programme scheduled for Villa Maria will commence there on Sunday 5 Oct, and will conclude on 10 Dec. Paul Sullivan will again direct the programme.

White Rabbit Still Calls Hunters Hill Home. The white rabbit which featured in the May edition of the Provincial Circular has defied the odds and escaped the attention of predators and well-meaning but over-enthusiastic confreres. Readers will recall that it first appeared around Easter time, and for the last four and a half months it has been roaming across the expanses of our Hunters Hill property.

Paul Glynn seems to have abandoned his attempts to speak to it in Japanese. The rabbit is very tame and holds no fear of humans, a disposition which may lead to its downfall if Tom Fulcher confirms his suspicions that the rabbit is nibbling his plants.

Light My Fire. On August 6 some piles of woodchips which had been deposited down the back of the Villa Maria property, following the felling of some dead trees, began smoldering and sending up tell-tale puffs of white smoke. The local fire brigade and a Hunters Hill Council bobcat were quickly on the scene and spent several hours trying to locate the seat of the fire. Source of the ignition was most likely an elaborate camp-fire constructed only a meter from the woodchips, which seems to have been constructed and used by someone during the previous 48 hours. Who? and why? are questions to which we don't have an answer. After the brigade had departed the smoke started billowing forth again, and further remedial work was needed the following day to completely extinguish the fire.

MAP Skype Meeting: at this year's MAP meeting in Davao in June a Skype meeting was organised for the

Provincial Assembly 2015: There will be an Assembly of the Province next year leading in to the Provincial Chapter scheduled for 2016. Tentative dates for the Assembly are 27, 28, & 29 of October, 2015, with the venue most likely being the Hunters Hill Parish Hall.





