From the Provincial

Dear Confreres

Over the last few months, with the approach of the centenary anniversary of the landing of the Australian, NZ, and British forces at Gallipoli, our media became saturated with all manner of programs and features to do with this most important event in our nation's history.

It was easy to be put off by a commercialism that began to creep into the competition between TV and print-media networks as they fought to get our attention and present us with material aimed at helping us appreciate what the Anzac event has come to mean in our history.

However, when Anzac day actually came around and we got caught up in the march or some ceremony of remembrance it was hard not to be moved.

Courage

This year in attempting to identify what was touching me as I participated in the Anzac event I found myself thinking about "courage".

At other times Anzac would mean other things but this year Anzac symbolized courage.

Dwelling on this I was conscious that the men and women from our nation and from other lands who were prepared to become involved in armed conflict in the interest of their nation, to the possible extent of losing their own life, have shown great courage.

Easter does the same thing in the Church. As we read through the Acts in our liturgy during this Pascal



period we cannot help but be hit by the courage of those first Christians standing up for their faith.

The presence of the Risen Jesus was strong enough for men and women of the early Church to display the courage that lead to martyrdom.

Many diggers didn't die and not all followers of Christ are called to be martyrs but it is obvious that being a soldier or being a Christian demands that one is being "courageous".

People show courage in all sorts of ways and it is a virtue that all of us must try to possess and live out where we can.

Inertia

Over a number of years, but especially over the last few, the inertia of our province has been very noticeable.

Arguably one of the few areas where we moved ahead in any significant way in recent years was in the building of Montbel and in the caring for our older confreres, and even this has received a lot of criticism.

It is not hard to draw up a long list of recent projects and initiatives that have died because there is a lack of enthusiasm in our group.

We have to be courageous and see this change!

What is happening with our prioritized ministries from the last Chapter?

For example, do we as a group really want to see St Patrick's flourishing as a Marist mission in Australia?

There are not a lot of visible indications at the grass roots level showing that we have a greater commitment to this ministry since 2009.

There are a lot of men saying that they realise reconfiguration with NZ will probably go ahead but it won't mean much change in the lives of most confreres.

There are others indicating that they we will throw out the anchors and stop reconfiguration because it won't change anything, we are just going to die out anyway.

This is all very negative and drains the enthusiasm that some in the province have.

As an equation, a lack of energy and enthusiasm is not equal to a lack of courage but it certainly is a big factor.

Looking for ways

The challenge is for us be courageous men, enthusiastic and looking for ways to give life to our province.

There are plenty of ways for us to do this.

We will find them if we just keep asking ourselves, "am I being positive and showing courage here" or "am I just throwing out the anchors and making life comfortable for myself"?

The confreres on the preparatory committee for our Assembly from 27 – 29th Oct are coming up with what looks to be a good program with some interesting initiatives.

As there are not going to be such things as regional meetings prior to the Assembly over the next couple of months we have to get out there to publicise and discuss such things as our prioritized ministries and reconfiguration with New Zealand.

I will do my bit by sending around

something to provoke discussion soon.

Honestly, we need to get involved in animated discussion in all these areas over the next few months. Not to do so will mean that we just fizzle out.

When we come to the Chapter next year we will be older men who maybe are not able to "do" a lot these days, but hopefully we are still young in outlook and are courageous men willing to make the little sacrifices we can, to ensure that our Marist life keeps flourishing wherever it exists.

He will see his surgeon for a post operation check early in May.



Overseas Medical Insurance: just a reminder that the Province has a policy with CCI which gives medical coverage for members of the Province travelling overseas provided they are under 90 years of age when they travel.

However, please notify Andrew Biddle or Peter McMurrich at the Provincial Office any time you are leaving Australia, particularly if you will be away more than a month.

In this latter case it is worth our while saving a few dollars and sus-

pending your Bupa coverage until you return.

Also, depending on where you are going and for how long, it is worth considering also being a Smart Traveler and registering on the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) website, so that the Australian Government has your contact details in an emergency.

Finally, if you are overseas for more than a month, and your Bupa coverage has been suspended while you're away, **Andrew needs your return boarding pass to reactivate your Bupa coverage.**

Valuations: Shortly we will choose a tender to value all the properties owned by the Marist Fathers. The valuation process may take a few months to complete.

This is completed every 5 years and not only provides us with information for our insurance provider but also gives us accurate figures for our accounting.

A representative from the company employed to carry out the task will make contact with all our residences to make a mutually convenient time that they are able to inspect the property.

They may need access inside as well as outside the house. The company will have a letter of introduction on Marist Fathers letterhead. Thank you for your understanding in providing access to your home.


Rental Assistance: Next week you will receive a new Authority and Direction and Tenancy Agreement to be <u>SIGNED AND DATED</u> by you to continue your eligibility to receive the rental assistance with your pension.

The new forms cover the three-year period 1st July 2015 to 30th June 2018 and have been prepared in accordance with the agreement between Centrelink and all Religious Institutions and indicate the new accommodation charge payable by the religious as \$650.00 per fortnight.

Please return the signed and dated form to Andrew Biddle as soon as possible so that he can present all eligible pensioner's agreements to Centrelink at the one time.
