From the provincial

Dear confreres

This is the last Provincial Circular for 2015. It has been a year with its share of highs and lows.

Individually and as a group we have certainly been the recipient of many graces straight out of the hands of God, and we have also experienced some disappointments.

We are all getting a little older and daily some seem to be confirmed in a view that their lives are no longer productive in God's eyes. Thank God, God does not see as man does (1 Sam 16:7) and, given our reality and the opportunities available to us, God certainly is able to be very pleased with our lives. We should be too.

Next year I believe we have a couple of blessed opportunities that will help us to be positive about our ministry and our personal lives.

Year of Mercy

On the 8th December, Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the Church began an extraordinary Jubilee Year, the Holy Year of Mercy.

This jubilee year of Mercy, centered on the mercy of God, concludes on the Feast of Christ the King 2016.

On the occasion Pope Francis announced the Year of Mercy he said, "I have often thought about how the church might make clear its mission of being a witness to mercy. It is a journey that begins with a spiritual conversion. . . . We want to live this year in the light

of the Lord's words: 'Be merciful, just as your father is merciful. (cf Lk 6:36)"

This Holy Year, which Pope Francis entrusted to Mary, Mother of Mercy, will surely be a great blessing for the whole Church but we Marists must make sure we pull out all stops and ensure this is a very special year for us, for "mercy" is an integral part of the Marist DNA.

The more we enter into celebrating this Year of Mercy the more clearly we will see that we are living deeply the inspiration and insight given to us by Jean Claude Colin and the early Marists.

Cardinal Walter Kasper wrote a book that apparently Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio was reading at the time of the conclave when he was elected as our present Pope and of it he says, "This book has done me so much good".

From what we have seen of Francis'



papacy we can see that mercy is a key part of his ministry and personal life.

As a scholarly work Kasper's, Mercy: The Essence of the Gospel and the Key to Christian Life (Paulist Press, 2014), it is not a light read but even for the plodder if taken slowly and reflectively it is surprisingly quite a manageable and enjoyable read.

I give it the strongest recommendation to men who want to make "mercy" a key and dominant part of their lives.

If looking ahead over the coming year you find focussing on "living mercy" is not going to be enough to occupy you we have a number of other big events to grab our attention.

We have a Chapter, where restructuring and our prioritized ministries will be given much attention; we have too the celebration of a very important Marist anniversary that will provide us with a lot to ponder over.

Fourvière pledge

2016 is the bi-centenary year commemorating the beginning of our Marist enterprise.

On 23rd July 2016 we will celebrate, with the 3 other religious branches and our lay Marists, the pledge made at Fourvière.

In the 200 years since twelve seminarians and newly ordained priests trekked the 800 stone steps leading up to Our Lady's chapel and made their pledge to found the of the society of Mari-ists so much has happened.

The young men in 1816 who made the

pledge on behalf of all who followed them did not know how history would unfold.

They did not know how our Marist name would evolve; how our spirituality and imitation of Mary in each branch would develop in similar but unique ways; the extent to which each of our five branches would grow and reach into many corners of the earth; how Mary was giving to us a charism tailor made to fit today's world.

The founding Marists are examples for us of people who lived by hope. Four of the original group were positive and got others to join them and from them the Marist dream developed.

We have to be the same. We have to let God develop the Marist enterprise as God wishes and we have to support it.

In our 2016 Provincial Chapter, to be held in June, "restructuring" possibilities will be a key matter discussed. As we will all be involved in discussion around this issue at meetings in late January 2016, I will not mention it or report on it here.

Prioritized works

The other big issue that will come up in the Chapter will be looking at what has happened in the prioritized works that were selected at our last Chapter.

In each prioritized work we will be challenged to see what we have done since the last Chapter.

We will have to ask if we have done enough; if we have been heading in the right direction; and where we need to head in the future.

A brief update on important things happening in each of these prioritised ministries.

1st Jan, 2016, will see a changeover of parish priests at St Patrick's. Ray Chapman has done an outstanding job leading St Patrick's over the last 6 years.

One only has to visit the parish to see signs of Ray's gifts. Many innovations introduced over coming months and years will be able to be traced directly back to ideas that come from Ray.

By the time of the Chapter the new St Patrick's team, headed by Michael Whelan, will be firmly established and we should have an indication of what the future holds for St Pat's over the coming years.

St Pat's is becoming recognised in our international Marist world as an important site and place where the Marist gift to the Church will develop.

Kevin Stewart has done a wonderful job during his nine years in charge of the Marist Mission Centre.

The MMC ministry has continued to grow under his leadership with an increase in both funds from donors and satisfaction from recipients throughout the Asia-Pacific wold.

Kevin has done tremendous groundwork in preparing for MMC's future and as he begins a well-earned break he will know that his work on planning MMC's future will be of immense value to those who eventually take over from him the direction of MMC.

A number of things are going on in the third of our prioritized ministries, the Hunters Hill Precinct.

Kevin Bates continues to work with the group whose representatives gave the report at our Assembly envisaging how the Villa precinct might develop.

This committee, however, has been asked to take a temporary pause in their work while the Provincial Administration engages the work of professionals to develop a Master Plan for the Villa precinct on behalf of the Marists.

Anticipating that Kevin Bates will remain as the parish priest of Hunters Hill for a number of years, he has agreed to take a three month sabbatical break in the first half of 2016.

Kev is well overdue for a break now and to expect him to wait another four years before he could take it would be a cruel demand.

The Province is most grateful to Kev, for

agreeing to this strategy, and to Willy Melteras, who will be the Acting PP during Kev's time of R & R.

Details have still to be settled but Australia and Oceania Provinces have agreed to go into a joint venture over what will happen in development plans involving part of the Marist Villa property and the Oceania House block on Rocher Avenue.

Well over my word limit, for which I apologize, on behalf of Peter Mac, Andrew Biddle, and myself, who make up the Prov Administration, and of the Provincial Council, Ho Ho Ho, and a Happy Christmas to all.

The organisers hope to provide simultaneous translation services in as many languages as possible.



Joe was presented with a beer mug inscribed "Joe Hall 99 Not Out".


Notable guests at the party in addition to Gerry were Paul Pidcock; John & Eileen Molloy; and Marie (McCosker) and her husband, Mick.

The Provincial Council has commissioned Paul to spend some time investigating the possibility, which he will do over the next 12 months.


Staff Changes at Maryvale/

Professional Standards

Declarations: The system which has developed around providing clearances for priests when they minister in other dioceses is universally recognised to be cumbersome and time-consuming.

A few months ago the archdiocese of Sydney started to put in place a system whereby priests in the dioceses of Sydney, Parramatta, Broken Bay, and Wollongong would be issued with a photo-card which could be used when they ministered in those four dioceses.

However, there were technical problems with creating the cards, and that project has lapsed.

There is some light at the end of the tunnel in that the Episcopal Conference and Catholic Religious Australia have agreed to a system whereby priests in good standing with be issued with a letter from their bishop or religious superior which they can use anytime they minister in another diocese.

A bit like the old celebret. This will obviate the need for chanceries and Provincial offices to issue documentation each time an individual wants to perform an act of ministry in another diocese.

Further down the track, the National Professional Standards Office is working on an electronic data base which can be accessed through a mobile phone application, so that the *bona fides* of visiting priests can be checked on the spot, electronically.





Demise of the White Rabbit:

Around Easter last year, a white rabbit appeared in the grounds of Villa Maria, and for the next 18 months made our property its home.

It developed strong bonds with several confreres in particular, who conversed with it, fed it from community stores, and occasionally sought its advice.
