From the Provincial

The second last week of June marked an extremely important moment in the history of our province, when around a third of our province members were present at the Provincial Chapter held at Hunters Hill from Monday 20th – Thursday 23rd.

Because of the decision we took to restructure with other Marist units in our region, this was an occasion that will certainly have a profound effect on all of our lives, even if in the day-to-day situation we note very little change from the way we have been living.

Restructuring and prioritising

The two big concerns that were before the 2016 Chapter were our vote on restructuring with other provinces in our region and relooking at our prioritized ministries.

We came back in a reflective manner to these two key issues time

and again. Other areas we looked closely at during the Chapter were our financial situation and prospects; the impact ageing has on us; the recruitment of vocations, and formation; the global governance of the Society; and our up-coming General Chapter.

The discussion around all of these things has provided the provincial administration with a focus for where, what, and how we should be moving in our mission over the next few years.

Listening to one another

There was a wonderful spirit in the Chapter. Many commented on this. One confrere remarked that we had come to discuss, not debate. Others noted that we were listening to one another.

For bringing this atmosphere to our gathering we must sincerely thank our Chapter Preparatory Committee and the Steering Committee. They did a superb job.

On the big question, whether or not we would be involved in restructuring, it was during the second day when we returned again to this question for reflection that a number of confreres mentioned that they could feel a movement, a change occurring in themselves and in the group.

Members of the Society

The change individuals could feel was described in different ways, but one or two clearly stated that they were beginning to identify themselves in their core as members of the Society of Mary rather than member of an Australian province. This was for them a great change.

Should New Zealand and Asia decide to be in a restructured Province with Australia, which I hope they do, I believe our transition has to be very gentle and very respectful.

Any sense of domination, imposition or take over by any one of the established units will be very damaging to the process.



We are entering into a new era, and while not denying the strengths and beauty of our respective pasts, it is essential for all of us to see ourselves as part of a new province, whatever it is called, and whatever it is going to be

Gently evolve

Let's not rush things. Let us take our time and gently evolve into our new entity. Let us not cling to the past when it is not necessary.

Also, let us embrace and be open to further structural change in the Society of Mary.

As far as the prioritization of our ministries is concerned the Chapter looked at the ministries we had chosen at the 2012 Chapter and found that they should remain our priority for the future.

St Pat's

It was clear that we still value greatly the mission of St Pat's in the name of the Church and we will remain committed to it.

Restructuring that might occur in the Society and the promotion of City Centred Church ministries by the General Administration have only underlined the position and value the province holds for St Pats.

Hunters Hill

Lack of clarity about what was meant when Hunters Hill was chosen in 2012 was still present in the Chapter's initial discussions but in the end both the parish faith community and the Marist communities of Maryvale/Montbel and Villa Maria were recognised as works of great priority for the province.

Marist Mission Centre

The Chapter also renewed its decision to see Marist Mission Centre as a priority ministry of the province.

There was quite a bit of discussion around how the Mission Centre was being reorganized, and although it

will not be able to operate as it did in the past, it is such a valuable work for the province and the wider Society that it continues to be a ministry we are strongly committed to.

Immense importance for all Marists

On 23rd July Marists the world over will be celebrating the 200th anniversary of a small but powerful act that marked the beginning of the Marist enterprise in Lyon, France.

It is a day of immense importance for all Marists and there will be appropriate celebratory gatherings in hundreds of countries all around the world.

In Australia our main celebration will be in Sydney at Villa Maria, with a thanksgiving Mass, and at St Joseph's College, where we will share a meal.

Like a brushfire

Over our 200-year history the Marist world has grown tremendously. Like a brushfire the four religious groups of the Marist family grew and spread rapidly.

In recent years the fire of the four religious branches is diminishing and is almost burnt out in some places but the Marist movement has been taken up by various lay groups who clearly identify themselves as Marist and the Marist spirit and values are perhaps wider and stronger than they ever were.

Mary and her way are extremely attractive to people of today who are committed to the mission of Our Lord.

Reservoir of Marian spirituality

The religious branches of the Marist family were graced by founders and inspired members who for over 200 years gained deep insights into a Marian spirituality.

Today that deep and rich reservoir of Marian spirituality has to be passed on and shared with lay people who want to identify with a Marist charism and lifestyle. We all must remain open to new expressions of our Marist life.

Time to look outward

Opportunities and directions for the growth of Marist life allowed by the Church in the early C19th for our first Marists are different to what the Spirit invites us to today.

The recent letter from our Superior General, *Time to look Outward*, is a great invitation for us to imagine outside the constraints or our past ways of doing things and go in new directions.

This is something each of us must do and we must allow others to do it also.

Jim Hargrave officially retired on June 24 as college chaplain at Marist Brothers', Ashgrove, bringing to an end 35 years of chaplaincy work in Marist Brothers' schools – 10 years at St Joseph's, Hunters Hill, and 25 years at Marist College, Ashgrove.

Jim will continue to live with the Brothers' community at Ashgrove, and will continue as chaplain to the community.

For 25 of the years Jim worked at Joey's and Ashgrove, each year he spent the whole of his long vocation (2 months) working in the Third World.

In the early days he worked teaching English in refugee camps in Cambodia. This was followed by relieving confreres in the Philippines who took a home leave and finally Jim did the same for confreres in Cameroon. In all cases his help was very much appreciated.


Chris Ketsore, who has completed his university studies in education, will stay on in Australia for several years, and will take on the role of school chaplain at Ashgrove.

Paul Hachey, from the American Province, will begin a three-year placement at St Patrick's, Church Hill, from late July.

Paul is a canon lawyer and has made several trips to this part of the world.

He has spent time in Fiji, assisting the Oceania Province with canonical issues, and last year spent a period at St Patrick's, assisting with the Mass and reconciliation programme.

We warmly welcome Paul to Australia and hope that his time with us will be enjoyable and



fulfilling.

Kevin Bates was expected back in Hunters Hill parish at the end of June following the completion of his mini-sabbatical.

His return to Australia may be providential, as the Geelong Cats dropped a game against lowly opposition on June 25, and Kev's prayers may be needed to arrest a possible form slump.

Tony Kennedy left Sydney after the Chapter to attend a Marist international formators' conference at La Neylière in July.

Next year he will be leaving the Pacific Regional seminary at Suva to direct an international Marist renewal programme, also based at La Neylière.

Lote Raiwalui on Visitation: our Assistant General for Australia, Fr Lote Raiwalui, has been with us since 4 June, and has spent his time based at Villa Maria and also at St Patrick's.

He was due to leave Australia on 29

June to attend the Chapter of the New Zealand Province from 3-8 July.

On return to Australia he will be heading north to Brisbane and Gladstone.

On Sunday 12 June, Lote preached at the 12 regular Sunday Masses at St Patrick's in support of the Marist Mission Centre appeal. He looked a little "spaced out" on the Sunday evening, but had recovered well the following morning for the first session of the MAP meeting at Hunters Hill.

Sydney Fourvière Celebration

Kevin Bates will be the celebrant and homilist. From there the action moves to St Joseph's college for a sit down meal, with short addresses from Br Michael Green FMS and Maria Baden from Marist Laity. Invitations were sent out during May.

Tom Maloney Portrait Unveiled: St Vincent's Hospital, Lismore, recently commissioned a portrait of Fr Tom Maloney sm by local artist Peter Smeeth.

The portrait was unveiled and blessed by Bishop Geoffrey Jarrett and has a prominent position in the hospital foyer.

When Paul Pidcock spoke to us about the portrait recently he said that the portrait was so lifelike "that Tom looks ready to leap out and greet you".

The accompanying plaque reads: "A priest, devoid of airs and graces, winning people by goodness and tenderness, blending in and becoming part of our community. His faith was real, genuine and boundless.

May his exemplary life be reflected in ours". On his tour of the hospital in February this year, the Papal Nuncio remarked: "this is what a priest is.... it is more important than the portrait itself".

MAP Meeting: this year's annual MAP meeting was held at Hunters Hill 13-14 June.

The first day was a public holiday in Sydney, a sign of either dedication or stupidity on the part of the participants.

David Kennerley and Neil Vaney came from Wellington; Ben McKenna and Susitino Sionepoe represented Oceania; and Pat Devlin and Chris Ganzon were there from the District of Asia. Lote Raiwalui represented the General Administration.

Reports from each unit were presented and discussed. Particular issues addressed were: vocations, personnel, reconfiguration/ restructuring in the Pacific and Asia, brothers in the SM, professional standards, structures in the SM, and renewal programmes.

On the second day, the first session was set aside for a meeting with Frs Gerald Arbuckle sm and Michael

Mullins sm, from the Refounding and Pastoral Development unit.

A fuller summary of proceedings is provided as an enclosure with this Provincial Circular.

Provincial Chapter: the 2016 Provincial Chapter, possibly the last Chapter of the Australian Province, commenced on the morning of Monday, June 20, and concluded in the afternoon of Thursday June 23.

During the Chapter short statements on Finance, Ageing, Professional Standards, and Vocations/Formation were approved; as declarations and decisions of the Chapter, these need to be submitted to the Superior General for approval prior to their publication in the Province.

On the final day of the Chapter, the Chapter, by a vote of 15 to 4, agreed to join a new combined province with the Province of New Zealand and the District of Asia.

In regard to restructuring, the focus now moves to the Chapter of the New Zealand Province, which commences on July 3; and to the Chapter of the District of Asia in August.

If there is agreement from all three Chapters, then work will commence on preparing for the establishment of the new Province, tentatively scheduled to spring into life on 1 January, 2019.

Tony Kennedy and Peter McMurrich were elected as delegates to the 2017 General Chapter; Michael Whelan and Paul Sullivan were elected substitute delegates.

For the first time in many years, the Chapter operated without the assistance of a facilitator. Paul Sullivan was elected President of the Chapter, and was joined on the Chapter Co-ordinating Committee by Michael Whelan, Michael Mullins, Peter McMurrich, and Tony Kennedy.


The Chapter was characterised by an excellent spirit, which the participants acknowledged during the concluding session.

Jubilarians' Mass and Dinner: this years' celebration was held in association with the Provincial Chapter.

The jubilarians were Paul Pidcock, Brian Conaghan, and Jim Esler (60 years); Bob Barber, Gerard Hall, Andrew Murray, and Paul Mahony (40 years); and Pius Jones (25 years).

Paul Pidcock presided at the Mass in Holy Name of Mary church, and Gerard Hall was the homilist.





The meal was held at Montbel, which proved an excellent venue, as was the case last year.

Tom Fulcher and Peter McMurrich proposed the toast to the jubilarians, and Paul Mahony spoke on their behalf in reply.

Australian Catholic Ministry

Register: So far 30 confreres have submitted applications for this online registry, which obviates the need to submit pesky documentation every time a confrere leaves his home diocese to perform ministry elsewhere.

Most of the applications have now been processed, and confreres have been issued with their unique registration number.

Film Crew Does it Tough: on what has been arguably the bleakest and most miserable day of the winter so far, a film crew took over the Hunters Hill parish parking lot and Holy Name of Mary church on June 27 to shoot some scenes for a docudrama on the life of Allan Bond.

Willy Melteras was seen loitering on the fringes of the set, offering hospitable assistance, and maybe angling for a bit part in one of the scenes.

Marist Mission Centre: The reorganization of MMC is close to completion. There are two main new features of MMC today.

MMC Advisory Committee. The main function of this group, meeting 4 times a year, and reporting through the Executive Officer to the Provincial Council, is to oversee the

eligibility, assessment and approval of all Mission Centre donations. The members of the Advisory Committee are: Fr Paul Sullivan sm (Chair), Sr Gail Reneker sm, Ms Margaret Walker, Br Allan Sherry FMS, Mr Tony Biddle, Mr Richard Croall, Mr Andrew Biddle, and the MMC Office Manager (as Minutes Secretary) – yet to be appointed.

AMCOA and MFIM: Most confreres would be aware that the Mission Centre has two arms – AMCOA (Australian Marist Centre for International Aid) and MFIM (Marist Fathers International Mission).

Donations to AMCOA are taxdeductible, and can be used only for overseas development projects according to Australian government guidelines. The funds cannot be used for promoting religion. Donations to MFIM are not taxdeductible and can be used for religious purposes.

In future the Marist Brothers under their Australian Marist Solidarity unit (AMS) will be responsible for the transfer of overseas designated funds from AMCOA to comply with the strict criteria of the Australian Government.

AMS will only provide this service to projects they currently fund, and will be responsible for project management and reporting.

The advantage to the Mission Centre is that it is relieved of all responsibility to develop overseas aid projects, and provide on-theground monitoring.

This significant change reflects the reality that there is already a high degree of commonality between projects supported by the Brothers and the Mission Centre.

Publications
