# From the Provincial

Dear Confreres,

#### The Chapter

As was noted in the previous Circular our Provincial Chapter took decisions which set the direction and goals for our immediate future in the Province. It is the task of the Provincial Administration over the next four years to try and implement those decisions as faithfully as it can.

For completeness it is worthwhile mentioning again those significant Chapter decisions which provide the roadmap determining our mission. These decisions concerned our restructuring with the units of Asia and New Zealand; our prioritized ministries; professional standards and integrity in ministry; finances;

vocations and formation; and concerning the status and activities of three of our provincial committees – Ageing; Social Justice; and Marist Charism.

A confrere recently remarked that, "all Chapters are a blessing and each possesses its own authority and grace." We need to keep this advice in mind and acknowledge its truth both in the case of our own Province and in the situation of New Zealand.

#### NZ decision

The New Zealand Provincial Chapter's decision not to adopt the process and timetable on offer for the restructuring of Asia, New Zealand and Australia, which Asia and Australia did accept, came as a surprise to many but in the big picture this is not a disaster from

which there can be no recovery.

The intention of the restructuring proposal presented to our recent Chapters was to animate the mission of the Society in Asia, New Zealand and Australia. This did not happen. A major deficiency of the proposal was that it was judged by some to be too absorbed with governance and organisational matters which in the end were found to be unworkable and frustrating. Mission was not enhanced by what was proposed.

A positive aspect of New Zealand's decision for us is that it has jolted us into realizing that our Chapter was not solely about 'restructuring'. It reminds us, as mentioned above, that our Chapter identified vital and concrete areas of life and mission that we must become involved in.

### Moving...

Any one of the overused clichés, 'going forward', 'moving on', or 'moving forward', aptly describe what must be driving us at this time. We must move on.

In 'moving forward' the Provincial Council does not want to see the impetus of our Chapter lost. The Council will organize two further regional meetings where the whole province is able to follow up on the Chapter in two key areas. One meeting will deal with professional standards matters and the other will deal with our finances and property.



To get things rolling in a follow up on 'prioritization of ministry', in many respects the most important issue considered by the Chapter, the Provincial Council will hold a meeting of the Provincial Council and the Marist team in St Pat's in the near future to discuss how the province can support this key work of the Society.

#### Fourvière

On 23<sup>rd</sup> July we celebrated the bicentenary of the occasion when young, recently ordained men from the seminary in Lyon, pledged to establish what would be the Marist enterprise. This key moment in the foundation of the Marists family deserved to be celebrated with gusto and in the company of all cousins sharing the Marist name. It was.

Over 250 Marists and supporters took part in our main Australian Fourvière celebrations held at Hunters Hill. Within the total number of those who attended there was a good representation from each of our four religious branches but the great majority of those present were lay Marists, many from the organizations of Marist Laity Australia and the Association of Marcellin Champagnat, a wonderful testimony to where and how our Marist enterprise is growing today.

# Statement of commitment

In 1816 a pledge was signed by the young would-be Marists of their sincere intent for the future. In preparing to celebrate Fourvière here in Sydney this year each branch of the family was asked to present a statement of commitment which reflected where their particular group was today. It was to be an updating of the commitment made at Fourvière.

Following the Fourvière Mass a number of confreres and others remarked very positively on the Marist Fathers statement of commitment. This statement, with minor alterations to make it more relevant to our province, came from

the Council of the Society in Dublin three years ago (CS13).

Our statement is, we believe, a truthful, accurate expression of what we Australian Marists are committing ourselves at the moment. We acknowledge the reality of our 'dying' but until the final obsequies are required we are clear about how we want to live and what will animate us.

As a Province we embrace wholeheartedly the reality of being a small and rapidly diminishing congregation in the Australian Catholic Church. As such we are challenged to become:-

- more focussed;
- more overtly Marist in spirituality and community life, in our identity and our mission;
- more international;
- more collegial;
- more open to working in collaboration with the laity;
- more courageous.

#### **Beatitudes**

If, as individuals and as a corporate group, we regard these standards as our 'beatitudes', each of us must keep judging ourselves by them. As a province in following through on the leadership given to us by the Chapter we have to sincerely and continually examine to see if we truly are, focused and remain focused to our mission; if we are genuinely collegial; if we are international; etc. If we find the way we are living is not Marist in its identity, mission, and spirituality, then we are obliged to change ourselves.

### **Our Future**

We are all eager to know what will happen now with regards any restructuring involving New Zealand, Australia and Asia. The General Administration may wish to make some intervention and if they do we will have to wait and see what that is.

For us over the next few years the question of personnel who can assume leadership roles in the

province remains a major concern. We have to keep this situation in mind and try to see it is addressed while adopting the cliché from many sports 'to play what is before us' rather than make predetermined plans of what we would like to do.

The Australian province because, according to our 'beatitudes', we want to be 'more international' and 'more collegial' definitely wishes to support collaborative ventures that are genuinely about mission.

Listening to confreres, however, it is clear we are not determined to salvage 'restructuring' at any cost. Window-dressing and cosmetic projects that do not enhance mission are not worth pushing.

Collaboration must give energy or it is not worth doing.

In summary, our province at this time is committed to following up on our Chapter decisions, consolidating our prioritized ministries, coming to some clarity around possibilities for restructuring / collaboration, at all times remaining faithful to our 'beatitudes' from CS13.

A mathematical equation:- Chapter decisions + statement of commitment = our future.

The next twelve months, leading up to the General Chapter, is a very important time for our province and for the whole Society. It is a time when we must hold up our province and Society in prayer and be listening attentively to the answer the Spirit gives to us. We Marists have had 200 years of grace and blessings and there is no reason why these should dry up today.


# **Personnel**

Fourvière day in Sydney: Members of all branches of the Marist Family recalled the promise of the Marist aspirants on July 23rd, 1816, to form the Society of Mary 200 years ago.

In Sydney a packed church of the Holy Name of Mary, Hunters Hill, celebrated the bicentenary of the Fourvière Pledge on July 23. Kevin Bates sm presided and preached at the Mass.

Afterwards 250 Marists and supporters gathered in the Br











Emilian Hall at St Joseph's College for lunch. During the buffet luncheon Mrs Maria Baden and Br Michael Green fms delivered addresses on 'Mary's work, Mary's Way'.
