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From the Provincial

Dear Confreres

It is good to be home. There is no place like it!

The XXIX General Chapter of the Society of Mary, held in the SVD Centro Ad Gentes in Nemi (Rome) from 17th Sept until 12th Oct, was a wonderful event and it was great to be part of it. Marked by a great spirit of cooperation, openness and hope, all those fortunate enough to be there will remember it for a long time. Confreres listened to one another, enjoyed each other's company, and then worked together very well to make the Chapter a success.

Many of those who had been to previous General Chapters remarked on the congenial and brotherly atmosphere they found at this Chapter.

Michael Whelan, Tony Kennedy, and I were honoured to be able to represent our province and we thank all the for the support you gave us through words of encouragement and prayer. Michael and Tony both made significant contributions to the Chapter.

A short document of four pages that gives a summary of the Chapter outcomes is available for anyone who asks for it. Hopefully, the official document giving all the decisions of the Chapter will be

available in the not too distant future.

There were 38 delegates at the General Chapter representing the 763 confreres in the seven provinces and three districts of the Society when the Chapter began.

The General Chapter has given us a very strong team to lead the Society through the next stage of our life. We saw, in the Chapter, that we are blessed in having a number of exceptional men in the Society who had the requisite strengths and skills to lead us well had they been chosen.

Following a very good discernment



process the Chapter came up with an experienced leader and a team who will now lead the Society through these uncertain times. John Larsen, sm, is our Superior General; John Harhager, sm, is the Vicar General, and completing the team are, Ben McKenna, sm, Juan-Carlos Piña, sm, and Paul Walsh. The team knows from the support they received at the Chapter they have a clear mandate with strong backing to lead us and make tough and decisive decisions around the Society's future.

From the outset of the Chapter there was a stated acknowledgement that the Society was in a critical state. All provinces and districts are experiencing difficulties in one form or another. When presenting his report as the out-going Superior General, John Hannan, posed the question 'whether or not we have a long-term future as a religious congregation'? John warned us that simply maintaining the status quo would not help us in the future. He presented a compelling case that was sobering but certainly not without hope.

Whether this call was fully heeded by all the delegates and whether it will be recognized and acted on by all units is an unknown. It will certainly be a great shame and very defining for the Society if this warning is not tackled fairly and squarely by us all.

Going on the reports that came from the various units of the Society, Australia is more realistic and honest about our situation and predicament than are some other units.

The Chapter has not handed down a number of big and startling decisions sending out shockwaves that will resound around the Society and bring drastic changes to our lives and mission. Rather it gave a few leads and opened up opportunities that will enable provinces and individuals to renew and refocus our Marist lives – if we want to take up the challenge.

Our Province, prior to the Chapter as well as now, is particularly interested in the question of governance and leadership for our future. This is a result of our aging and diminishment; because of our small and every shrinking pool of capable leaders; and because options for restructuring and amalgamation were not taken up over recent years.

We have scheduled an Extraordinary Provincial Chapter for next March, preceded by Regional meetings, where we will be addressing the issue of our leadership and governance from 2018.

Australia, through our last Council of the Province, submitted a postulata to the General Chapter requesting a change which allowed for a few options for electing our provincial other than the process we currently have. In acknowledging this postulata the Chapter passed a one word change in Constitution #205. If it is approved by the Holy See that number will in future say the provincial is 'selected' rather than 'elected' according to our legislation.

Although it is only one word this change will enable our Chapter next March to look at a number of options that, taking into account our limitations, will help us in getting our future provincial leaders. The options are: - election by membership, as we have now;

appointment by the Superior General, after a consultation; or, election by an electoral body, such as, a Provincial Chapter, a Council of the Province; or another body.

The Chapter also passed a decision where some 'particular works' of the Society can be identified and the GA will work with the local unit to ensure their continuation. It is envisaged that these works will be few in number, no more than a half a dozen. When examples of these works were cited St Patrick's was always among those mentioned. For our province this is good news as it says that our first prioritized work is greatly valued by the Society and something the whole SM will work towards maintaining. At present this is not a guaranteed situation for St Pat's, but it looks promising.

Space in this Circular simply does not permit sharing with you on so many of the great things to come from the Chapter. I would, however, like to share a word on a few things.

'Safeguarding' is now the word universally used to cover the area we once referred to as 'professional standards'. The issue was very prominent in the Chapter, and thankfully, it seems that the whole of the Society is on-board about its importance and is willing to act to see there is proper compliance. Safeguarding was consciously acknowledged in every area discussed in the Chapter but will have its own section in the Chapter documents. Although, as it went through the stages of its development, the Safeguarding document was cut of specifics and drastically cut in length its standing in the Chapter could not be underestimated.

The Chapter made few changes to the basic direction of the 2009 Chapter, but it did add a few key areas. For example, in recognition of our aging membership around the Society the Chapter gave good recognition to the Elderly. These confreres are a treasure to our communities and add a unique

contribution to the life and ministry of our provinces. Again, hopefully we will make the valuing and loving of our senior confreres more important in our lives as a result of the Chapter.

Laudato si' and the call for greater awareness and care of creation came up everywhere in the Chapter. The Chapter leaves us with the goal of trying to live more ecologically sustainable lives and care for our world. The Chapter declares this is an intrinsic part of the gospel today, very much in line with values bequeathed to us by Colin and the early Marists, and so much a part of Pope Francis' message to us. Each of us, individually and as communities, must make ourselves aware of our obligations and take steps to improve in this area.

Trying to find ways of sharing with the province the fruits of the Chapter is something I am not sure how to do. Please give me a ring or tackle me as we pass if you have any questions you want to ask or issues you want to discuss. The Chapter had some great things to say on our mission, on our ministries, on our contemplative life, and Marist Laity, and so many other topics.

Retreat time is on us and the celebration of our Jubilarians. May all who are doing a retreat at this time be greatly blessed and congratulations to our jubilarians. I have to leave off here as I am well over my word limit.

During the visit he met a direct descendant of Musumusu; the exchange is understood to have been amicable, with no adverse consequences (for either party).


Ray Chapman completes his course in Spiritual Direction in Melbourne in late November.

News

Hunters Hill Parish celebrated the feast of the Holy Name of Mary on Sunday, September 10, with an open -air Mass in the Villa Maria grounds.

The Mass was preceded by the placing and blessing of a memorial stone, at the front of Holy Name of Mary church, marking the 150th anniversary of the laying of the original foundation stone and the commencement of construction.

The church was completed in 1871, though a substantial addition was made to the nave of the church in 1903-4. No trace survives of the original foundation stone. The new memorial stone is pictured below, (complete with Holy Water splash marks).



Election for Extraordinary Chapter, 13-15 March, 2017: voting papers for the first stage of the election of delegates to the Extraordinary Chapter were due to go out by November 1.

The Chapter will have a specific focus on Governance and Leadership issues, and will run for a couple of days only. It is not envisaged that it will produce any aspirational

documents, or formally receive and analyse reports from the Provincial and Business Manager.

In short, it will be a lean and focused meeting, shorn of most of the bells and whistles associated with regular Chapters.

Choosing the Provincial: the recent General Chapter voted in favour of a small but significant change to Constitution 205, regarding the Provincial Superior, changing the word "elect" to "select".

The effect of this is to allow Provinces to have their Provincial chosen by the Superior General, after consultation with members of the Province, instead of direct election of the Provincial, which has hitherto been the practice.

This is one of the matters for discussion at the regional meetings on "Governance and Leadership" scheduled for November.

Fake News: Many confreres would be familiar with a story concerning Fr Peter Piquet, who ministered at St Patrick's for 56 continuous years: he is supposed to have been accosted by a beggar, and when he put his hand in his pocket he was amazed to find a sovereign there, which he gave to the beggar.

Later that day at the meal table, Piquet recounted the incident, expressing the belief that the beggar had been the beneficiary of a miracle. "Miracle be damned", said his confrere, Peter Le Rennetel: "I've been searching for my trousers all morning, and you're still wearing them".

A different version has turned up, this time with Peter Le Rennetel as the main character. The story was printed in *Smith's Weekly* in 1919, in an article written by J F Archibald, previously editor and owner of the famous *Bulletin*, and donor of the Archibald Fountain in Hyde Park, and the Archibald Prize.

Next time you're off to Lowe's to buy a pair of trousers, you might consider the following extract from Archibald's article, and keep your confreres in mind:

"The Marists are good socialists, even communists; all their worldly goods are held in common, even their clothes being interchangeable when they happen to fit – and sometimes when they do not fit, as witness the quaint public appearances made by the Fathers, in coats that are too long and hats that are too big, and trousers too wide and short....."

The sceptics at the Provincial Office think both versions are dodgy, and deserve to be ranked with the hoary St Patrick's story about the sacristan who gift wrapped a dead cat, and put it on a back pew, returning shortly afterwards to find that a thief had ran off with the parcel.

Variations on this story are over 100 years old, with the first recorded version appearing in the *New York Times* in 1905.

Provincial Council Roadshow: the Provincial Council will be hitting the road in November, paying a visit to Gladstone in the fourth week of November, and holding its monthly meeting there in addition to catching up with confreres in Central Queensland.

St Peter Chanel, Woolwich: the Province has now submitted a development application to the local Council for a subdivision of the church grounds at Woolwich, to create two house blocks on the sloping land overlooking the Lane Cove river.

When the property was purchased by the Society in 1889, the Marist Superior, Claude Joly (who looks anything but in his photographs), noted that the amount of land purchased was in excess of what was needed for the church building, and that some of the land might be later sold if and when that became necessary.

Once the development is approved, the two house blocks will be put on

the market.

Japanese Pilgrims: a group of 8 Japanese pilgrims were in Sydney in early September, hosted by Paul Glynn at Villa Maria. Their particular focus was Mary MacKillop, and a highlight of their trip was a visit to the saint's tomb at North Sydney.

Publications

In anticipation of next year's double celebration at St Patrick's — bicentenary of the leaving of the Blessed Sacrament by Fr Jeremiah O'Flynn (1818), and the sesquicentenary of Marist presence at St Patrick's (1868) — Michael Whelan has commissioned a reprint of the parish history, *The Harmonising Influence of Religion: St Patrick's*, Church Hill, 1840 to the Present, which was published in 2011 and quickly sold out.

The reprint has provided an opportunity to fix a few typographical errors which appeared in the first edition, but otherwise contains no new material; a banner on the front, which reads "2018"

Anniversary Edition" distinguishes the reprint from the original edition. A steal at \$20 a copy from St Patrick's parish office or courtyard coffee shop.




The Marist Brothers have elected a new superior general at their General Chapter, **Br Ernesto Barba** (no relation to Bob). See next page.


