courage and vision to what Mary is asking of her Society at this time.

<u>Mexico</u>

3rd Meeting of Marist Laity - México 2017

In February 2017 Marist Laity held a weekend retreat at Our Lady of Nazareth House, in the community of La Jordana in El Oro, México. The retreat theme was the Apostolic Exhortation, Amoris Laetitia ("The Joy of Love") from the 2016 Synod of Families. Leaders from different communities presented the themes which allowed us to be enriched by the way each group works.



An Exceptional Weekend: Committed Lay people from the different Mexican communities (CPP, CPU, IFC, San Bernardino, Toluquilla and



Contadero) and some the Priests along with the Provincial Pedro Alarcón gathered together to listen, reflect and deepen our understanding of the issues raised by Pope Francis. It was an exceptional weekend with Lay and Religious exploring ways to implement Amoris Laetitia in Mexico. We shared common conclusions that we can apply in our own communities and apostolic groups.

The Year of the Family: Shared activity like this is very helpful as we embrace our identity as a Lay Mexican branch of the Marist family. This retreat continued the work that Laity have been doing for more than two years and the presence of the priests was an encouragement to persevere as Marist Laity in the work of evangelization and building the kingdom of God in the manner of our mother Mary, our supreme superior. We decided to make this 2017 - 2018 the "Year of the Family". This will help each community

focus on the needs of families, based on the teachings of Amoris Laetitia from the retreat.

In conclusion, the retreat increased our impetus to continue working and learning more about Marist Spirituality in order to continue to spread it in the different communities within which Laity are assigned.








A testimony of Mission



MARIST FRATERNITIES IN AFRICA,

The dream of Colin to make the whole world Marist resonated in Africa with Cameroonians, Senegalese, Congolese, Rwandese, Burundian, Togolese and Beninese all responding to the free call of the Virgin Mary. The Marist Fraternities are particularly found in Senegal, Cameroon and the Great Lakes region (D.R.C, Burundi, Rwanda).

CAMEROON: In Cameroon, the Laity responded to Mary's call more than a decade ago. At present there are three Marist Fraternities in the Central and North-Western Regions, in the parish of Saint Anne d' Obili (the oldest) Archdiocese of Yaounde; In the parish of the Sacred Heart of Jesus of Mbockulu, Diocese of Mbalmayo (the youngest); In the parish of Our Lady of Fatima in Bambili in the Archdiocese of Bamenda.

The Fraternities of Obili and Bambili developed under the impulse of the Marist Fathers who animate these parishes, while that of Mbalmayo grew from the experience of a secular Marist part of Bambili. The Marist Fathers are in that diocese. It is important that the other Fraternities support Mbalmayo to sustain and develop the knowledge and appropriation of the Marist Spirit among new and existing members.



Our most recent activity was a training session led by Irène Marlise Kimo Sake and Professor Roger Kasiama in Mbalmayo in February. Irene Marlise currently coordinates the

Marist Fraternities of Cameroon. She is also the doyenne of all Cameroon Lay Marists, and has made her final promises.



Most groups are made up mainly of mature women, then mothers of families, and some young men though men are the minority. This reminds us that our Mother was the first to believe and on

Easter morning it was women who were the first witnesses of the resurrection. Perhaps that is why women are the first to be fascinated and respond to the gracious

call of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Through Marist spirituality Marist Lay women in Cameroon first seek serenity in their everyday life following Mary who meditated everything in her heart. They are inspired by her availability and discreet yet effective presence in the Church of her Son. Gradually men come to understand that this Spirit is not just for women, but a way of following Jesus by imitating the first disciple par excellence, Mary, who was there at the birth of the Church and will be also there at the end of time.

This year we are preparing for our **general assembly and spiritual retreat in Yaoundé**, during which some members will make their final promises. This will also be an opportunity for the new Mbalmayo fraternity to meet their brothers and sisters from the other groups. *Emilienne Liliane* MVOGO

Three yearly Gatherings

Each fraternity rules its own activities according to the realities of its environment as well as the needs of the local Church. We remain bound by one and the same Spirit: the Marist Spirit. Every three years we have combined activities that allow us to meet together within the framework of the Cameroon coordination. These gatherings last between four and five days and are always times of communion and spiritual retreat, communion with fathers and young people in formation, and communion between the members of the different fraternities despite some linguistic barriers.

SPAIN

Solidarity with Peru: The storms in Peru have devastated and isolated some areas next to Sullana and Callao, where two groups of Lay Marists are located. There are some projects being developed in

partnership with the local Lay people and Marist Laity in Spain, creating new facilities and supplying material and provisions.

Holy Week Mission: A few Lay Marists and Marist Fathers in Spain took part in a mission to share Holy Week with a



religious community of sisters in Sahagún, a town on the Santiago's pilgrimage way. They were involved in the celebrations and helping the pilgrims.

FIJI

In mid-January 2017 the staff of Marist Training Centre (MTC), Tutu on the island of Taveuni, Fiji made their annual two-and-a-half day silent retreat. This retreat is an annual event immediately preceding several days of meetings and planning to begin the year of living out the mission of MTC in the spirit of Mary.

MTC is a rural training centre offering holistic formation



for married couples, single women and young farmers coming from the north-east of Fiji. MTC staff include Marist Fathers and Brothers as well as Marist Laity.

This year's retreat introducing Christian Meditation was given by the Christian Meditation team in Fiji who are also members of the Marist Family, Laity and an SMSM Sister.



Since the retreat many MTC staff members have continued the twice daily practice of contemplative prayer which is at the heart of Marist spirituality.

Brazil

Firstly we would like to share our memories of the 6th National Encounter of the Marist Laity in Palmas de Monte Alto, Bahia 2017.



The theme was "How can Marist Spirituality help us face the challenges to be church." Those were special days in which we lived our Marist Spirituality and strengthened our ties to the Marist Family. People came from Caruaru, Curitiba, Belo Horizonte, Ribeirao das Neves, Ji-Parana. Also present were seminarians of the Marist Fathers, Marist Sisters and Marist Brothers.

On April 20 to 23 the four branches of the Marist family in Brazil met at a National Meeting of the Marist Family with the theme: *Promise, fidelity and commitment.* It was the first meeting of the entire family of Mary present in Brazil. The Meeting was a time to share the Mission that we embraced 200 years ago.





At least 100 Marists from the north to the south of Brazil were present.

We also had the opportunity to celebrate as Marist family on the Feast of St. Peter Chanel April 28, 2017 with the four branches present in the city of Belo Horizonte,



New Caledonia.

During Easter the Third Order of Mary (the most numerous branch of Marist Laity in New Caledonia with around 1,600 members) had two opportunities to get together despite the distances between each group. The first time was to celebrate Easter Monday in the chapel of Dumbarton-on-Sea, about 15 km north of Noumea. The second time was on April 28 for the 176 years of the martyrdom of St Peter Chanel, in the Saint-Michel chapel, just outside Noumea.





On both occasions, some 200 people came to share the joy of the Risen Lord living among us, and who led Father Chanel to Oceania. The wellanimated Masses (in Wallisian) were presided over by Father Georges Sao, a diocesan priest from Wallis, assisted by Fr. François Grossin, who concelebrated (in French).

The Third Order met for the third time on 14 May in La Conception, about 10 km south of Noumea, for the 60th anniversary of the official presence of

the Third Order in New Caledonia. A lot of people came and many pigs were sacrificed!

On March 24, the Office of Marist Laity resumed meetings in Salt River Parish, with representatives from each grouping of the laity embracing Marist spirituality. We reviewed last year's activities and made numerous plans for the year ahead reflecting the dynamism of each sector.





Sophie shared: "I am so glad I was given the opportunity to visit the boys. They show great optimism and love; it challenges you to reconsider what's really important in life."

Agdao mothers group: The Marist Sisters formed this mothers group to help them build an income stream. They

also set up a school where mothers teach preschool children the basics. Bo Dumas, a physiotherapist, taught them about women's health and led them in giving a shoulder, neck and head massage. She said, *"I was really glad I* could talk to some mothers. They seemed really happy we came...Their hospitality



was heart-warming ."

Davao City Jail: (by Margaret Woods) We went to the prison in Davao and celebrated Mass with men who were ill or over 50. We then moved to the women's prison, passing by where the Marist Sisters teach computer skills to both women and men prisoners. The attractive prison veils the reality that cottages built



for 12 to 15 women, have 30 women per cottage. At night they sleep on the floor on mats on their sides so all can fit. This reduces their capacity to turn, lie on their backs, or change position at night.

Badjao Refugee Pre-school. Maria Baden wrote: "What did I learn? Children are children wherever they be. Joy is not contingent on monetary wealth. We have far more than we need – they need far more. Education is key—You can learn to walk on rickety planks with practice.

Europe Upcoming Events:

SM European Chapter

In considering their relationship with Laity some interesting points came from the SM European Chapter as follows:

a. 'Laity' means more than Marist Laity. Let's welcome all laity to work with us and share with them our ideals, visit Marist Places etc.

- b. Laity working with us should have real responsibility (not only depending on the religious)
- c. How to re-start with younger people?

d. How many of our relatives or friends know about Marist Laity?

e. We should move towards full cooperation with Laity.

f. Let us remember: the raison d'être of the Laity is not our need of them.

g. We should promote among them the Marist Spirit, a spirituality adapted to their state in life.

h. There are no levels or degrees of Marist life, there are just different groupings: 1) those who cooperate with us religious; 2) those who live their Marist life in the context of their own vocation.

i. A form of cooperation is also the ministry of intercession.
