Additionally, this priority will also underpin making greater connections with schools originally founded by Marist Fathers and Marist Sisters.

We are all deeply saddened by the events that have taken place in Bondi in Sydney, both for our Jewish brothers and sisters and for our Muslim brothers and sisters. We are all Australians. The killing of innocent lives strikes at the heart of our Australian values that each person is made in the image and likeness of God. That each person, both adult and child, is precious.



In 1219, Saint Francis of Assisi travelled to Egypt to end the war between the Christians and Muslims. Francis called for peace. The Christian armies laughed at him. Calling him a

"clown". Despite this setback, Francis risked his own life by crossing enemy lines. The Muslim armies had been given orders to kill any Christian on sight. Remarkably, Francis survived. Gaining an audience with the lead Muslim, the Sultan Al Kamil. The Sultan recognised Francis as a holy man.



This act reminded me today of the Australian and Muslim Ahmed al Ahmed, who fought to disarm the gunman face-to-face. Ahmed was shot twice. Ahmed, a modern-day Francis of Assisi. Wanting to end violence. Even if it costs him his life.

Today, let us be Francis to one another. To seek peace. To disarm those who cause violence, both in our world and more fully in our hearts. At Christmas and in the new year, where there is conflict and tension within our family, friends, or colleagues, may we be instruments of peace.

Please pray this prayer attributed to Saint Francis and commit to being instruments of peace in our lives. We also pray for those who have died, but also those who suffer at the hands of violence.

Let us pray

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

On Saturday, 29th November, the three Christian meditation groups – Wollongong, Kiama and Gerringong – came together for a beautiful day of reflection at the Benedictine Abbey, Jamberoo. There were 30 of us!

Group leaders, Monica Dowdell, Michele Broad and Maria Baden chose the John Main quote to highlight the power that comes when we meditate together regularly.

The day was facilitated by Sister Magdalen Mather OSB using the Abbey's yurt as our sacred space.

We began with breaking open the quote, Sr Magdalen slowly reading it several times, letting the words and wisdom sink into our hearts. We then broke into small groups, going out into the peaceful grounds of the Abbey with two questions to ponder:

First, where does this quote meet your experience of meditating in community?

Second, what does "real presence with others" feel like in your body/practice?

Returning to the larger group, those who wished were able to share their insights.

A 25-minute meditation followed, and then morning tea.



Sister Magdalen, whose personality is full of joy and humility, was so engaging. Her words of wisdom, so simple and true, touched us all.

Of particular note was the the beautiful song by Sara Thomsen, BY BREATH, which expresses so powerfully our connectedness and which echoes the deep mystery of unity among us and within us when we meditate together on a weekly basis.

The other form of prayer used was the WALKING CIRCLE, a symbol of unity. This simple dance is based on the Julian chant using Julian's words and an action:

Allowing – Attending – Accepting. An embodied prayer which shows the power of community bringing us to deep prayer and communion with Christ.

We ended the day with a second meditation.

The wind in the trees, the hurrying clouds and the chanting of birds kept us in union with God's creation.

Sister Magdalen encouraged us to make more use of this precious Abbey. We are all Benedictines in this Prayer of the Heart.

Anna and Alana Davao Presentation

In December, Alana Leahy and Anna Ramsay presented at Mercy College and St Patrick's Church Hill, sharing insights from their recent five-week mission immersion in Davao, Philippines. They spoke passionately about their time working with the girls at Balay Banag and the boys at Balay Pasilungan orphanages, offering a moving glimpse into the lives of the children they encountered.



Through personal stories and reflections,
Anna and Alana helped audiences develop a
deeper understanding of the daily challenges
these young people face. Yet, amidst the
hardship, their presentation was marked by
hope, joy, and deep connection. By becoming
part of the children's everyday routines,
sharing meals, laughter, play, and
conversation, they were able to build genuine
relationships and bring moments of joy and
dignity to the lives of those they met.





Marist Way Australia Guidelines Reviewed

During 2025, Marist Way Australia dedicated several days to a careful and prayerful review of its Guidelines, reaffirming its identity as a contemporary expression of the Marist charism lived in everyday life. Central to this review was the significant name change from "Marist Laity Australia" to "Marist Way Australia", a shift that reflects a more inclusive and accessible understanding of the Marist call, one that welcomes all who are drawn to live the Gospel in the spirit of Mary, regardless of formal affiliation. Grounded in the original vision of the Marist founders, the revised Guidelines emphasise simplicity, inclusiveness, flexibility, and a commitment to renewal within the Church, highlighting the role of lay Marists in responding to the signs of the times by bringing God's presence into the ordinary realities of life and society.



The review also clarified the purpose, objectives, and structures of Marist Way Australia, with a renewed focus on formation, communication, collaboration, and outreach. Particular attention was given to strengthening relationships across the wider Marist family, nurturing opportunities for spiritual growth, and supporting evangelisation through a compassionate presence, especially among those on the margins. The updated Guidelines reaffirm the role of the Core Committee in animating this mission and ensuring shared leadership, sound governance, and responsible stewardship. Overall, the review has renewed Marist Way Australia's commitment to fostering "Mary's Spirit active in the world today," as it continues to invite people to follow Christ.


