Marist Asia - Celebrating 40 Years

Forty years ago four Marists set out to start a Marist Mission in the Philippines during the time when Fr. Bernie Ryan sm was Superior General of the Marist Fathers. Two of these Marists were from NZ, one from Tonga and the other from Ireland all with a commitment to serve the most vulnerable and disadvantaged in the spirit of Mary.

The mission was founded on the southern island of Mindanao and since that time over thirty Marists have made a commitment to this mission. The mission has been blessed with vocations from the Philippines and is now known as the District of Asia with an outreach in Thailand.

Fr. Chris Ganzon sm, a Filipino, is their leader. The mission has included ministries to refugees, street boys & girls, prisons, youth, a Parish, chaplaincies to the University and people with mental disabilities, interreligious dialogue and vocations.

Sr. Juliana Toluono smsm at the Anondo Neer Centre, Dhaka City, Bangladesh conducts a program for children/young adults with multiple disabilities and their families. These people are mostly ignored, rejected and considered as a curse in their culture and as a source of shame to their family. The Centre steps in to embrace these children of God to provide them with a safe haven full of love and peace.

The motto of MMC is "Sustaining Hope". Another example of this motto is the Agri-Poultry project in Cameroon, Africa, initiated by Fr. Luigi Savoldelli sm from Italy. Fr. Luigi grew up in a farming community near Brescia and has now taken these skills to create a unique project in poor rural communities. Building self-sustaining communities strengthens the identity of the local community and avoids the pressure on young people to leave their villages to become vulnerable refugees seeking their future in Europe.

I wish you and your family abundant blessings as move into the season of Lent and Easter.

Celebrating Marist Presence and Mission in Asia - 40 Years

- AMCOA Project-

The Marist presence in Asia was enriched in 1998 with the arrival of two Marist Sisters from Fiji. Sr. Torika and Sr. Veronica joined the Marist mission on the southern island of Mindinao near Davao City. Mindinao has a rich history that includes indigenous, ethnic and diverse religious groups with significant underlying tensions and conflicts. A special feature of the mission is an outreach to the most vulnerable and disadvantaged.

Philippines - Balay Banaag - Street Girls - Marist Sisters

Young girls are especially at risk of abuse and exploitation when they take refugee on the Streets to escape family problems. Balay Banaag means "First Ray of Light of the Morning Sun" and offers hope in the midst of darkness. These young girls are willing to assist others in time of need.

Due to poverty, family violence and mental health issues, young boys take refuge on the streets of Davao City for food and money only to be placed at further risk of abuse and exploitation. The Centre offers a safe place to live and find hope.

Thailand - Ranong - Marist Asia Foundation - Marist Fathers



In the 1990's the Marists in the Philippines discerned that they were called to be missionaries and so decided to open a Centre for refugees from Myanmar in Ranong, Thailand. These refugees are escaping war and poverty in Myanmar only to be confronted by discrimination and poverty in Thailand.

The Marists offer education and health programs to young people and their families.

House of Joy

Bangladesh - Daka - Anondo Neer - SMSM

Anondo Neer means 'House of Joy' with Sr. Juliana Toluono SMSM from Samoa as Leader of the Program. The Centre supports young people who experience multiple disabilities and offers them dignity, inclusion and hope. Covid has had a significant impact on the capacity of the Centre to keep contact with all who need support. Sister Julianna shares some of the challenges and good news stories from the House of Joy.

A 20 year old young man who is physically and intellectually challenged. He is bedridden and cannot provide self care or do anything by himself. His father has abandoned both him and his mother and so it is very difficult for his mother to care for him as he grows older. During Covid times the Centre has assigned a male assistant and female assistant to help with massages and exercises to support him while he is confined to his home.

An 11 year old girl with Down Syndrome. She can be very demanding of others and especially of her mother who is herself unwell to do things for her at home. She is aware of all the Covid safe practices and is able to ensure that others follow Covid instructions such as washing hands, keeping safe distances and showing affection in ways that do not involve physical touch.

A 32 year old woman with physical and intellectual disabilities and epilepsy. She has limited mobility and falls easily. She likes to do colouring and writing but because of her vision impairment is finding it difficult to continue with these activities. Her mother is a nurse and is struggling to cope with her at times her demanding behavior. She enjoys company, doing physical exercises within the house, taking short walks and receiving phone and video calls from the Centre during Covid restrictions.




CARE OF OUR SPIRIT
