## JUBILEE YEAR 2025

As widely expected, Rome is the heart of the Jubilee in Italy. It attracts the attention of many people (pilgrims and tourists) from all over the world. The presence of the Vatican, the Pope, St. Peter's Basilica, the Roman basilicas and the beauty of the Eternal City leaves little room for other realities that also exist. This year, the death of Pope Francis and the election of Pope Leo XIV have given Rome even greater appeal.

But the Jubilee Year is not only in Rome! All our cities and territories are dotted with "Jubilee Churches", where every believer and every pilgrim can receive the gift of indulgence, reconciliation and forgiveness. There are countless places in Italy, some more famous than others, worthy of this honour and service.

When our diocese informed us at the end of November 2024, with a simple phone call, that our Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes had been chosen as one of the six Jubilee Churches in the city of Turin, we were very surprised. We would never have imagined that our little Marist church, immersed and almost hidden by the tall buildings of Corso Francia, would be called to such an important service. Our community, together with some lay people, made itself available for jubilee celebrations, confessions and hospitality. In recent months, various parish and ecclesial groups have visited the Sanctuary to celebrate their Jubilee. We are present to animate the celebrations and to hear confessions, always in collaboration with the parish priests. We have noticed a considerable increase in confessions.

Pope Francis chose as the motto for the Jubilee "Pilgrims of Hope", to "foster the restoration of a climate of hope and trust, as a sign of a renewed rebirth that we all feel is urgently needed". We hope that our simple service will bear fruit of hope and trust in all those who come to us to welcome the infinite love of the Father.

### **EUROPEAN PROVINCIAL RETREAT 2025**

This provincial retreat was first and foremost an opportunity for a fraternal reunion with regulars of what had become an institution: from Norway to Spain, from Ireland to Italy, the European retreat allows us to get to know each other and then to meet again, in true joy, praying together, close to the Founder, in our various languages.

Participants in the last retreat found it like a workshop and asked for more time for prayer. The 2025 edition was organized to respond to this. There were over twenty retreatants. The Provincial, Fr. Kevin Duffy, preached the retreat, with Odile de Villenaut, Provincial Secretary, in charge of the organisation. It took place in complete silence for four days, focusing on our Constitutions. We reread passages from the current Constitutions (1987) in the light of the Constitutions written in 1872 by the Founder. The Colinian text points to paths that have been somewhat forgotten but are regaining importance in today's world. Thank you to the translators!

The last day was an 'Emmaus journey' of sharing and evaluation. During Mass, the religious vows and lay promises were renewed. René Godard and Raymond Pelletier celebrated their 50 years of priesthood. Jimmy McElroy coordinated the collective prayer, following the rhythm of La Neylière, Lauds, Mass and Vespers. Jean-Marie Bloqueau, the superior of the community, presided over the services. The La Neylière team took care of the daily routine with dedication, and we enjoyed cuisine that lived up to its reputation.
