Thailand: Marist Asia Foundation Ranong

Great to see all the Burmese Migrant Secondary Programme students return to school and no longer on a day on/day off routine.

The 180 students aged 12-17 are the lucky ones in the Ranong community that can continue with their education. Other Education centers have been closed due to government decisions.



Education is highly valued in the Burmese refugee community. These migrant students are aiming higher with their English learning. They want to get a better job or a scholarship to University courses and now have the chance to complete 6 months of learning. The Students in Ranong are preparing for the entrance test to the Australian Catholic University Online Diploma Programme in 2021.

RESTORATION AFTER CYCLONE HAROLD

MaeRa Moo Refugee Camp Hostel

The Hostel was established in 1999 with MMC support. The Hostel on the Thai-Burmer border provides a safe and positive environment for the students to live and study. They form a small community with the support of a hostel manager and share all cooking and household duties.

Up to 25 students studied at the hostel during the 2019 -2020 academic year. Ten of the students completed their studies and are now working or commencing continuing education. Some have returned to Karen State and have become teachers in their home communities.

Sadly COVID-19 has affected some of the students' ability to complete their studies because of travel restrictions.
