A MARIST MISSION IN SAMSUN, TURKEY.

On December 14th, 2023, Fr. Donato Kivi arrived in Samsun, a city on the northern coast of Turkey to be part of a shared mission of two Marist religious communities, the Society of Mary and the Sisters of the Missionary Society of Mary. The community consisted of Fr. Arnaldo, SM (Brazil), Fr. Donato SM (Fiji), Sr. Juliana, SMSM (Samoa) and Sr. Irene, SMSM (Rwanda). They served under the Vicariate of Anatolia—a vast territory covering Eastern Turkey, from the Black Sea in the north to the Mediterranean in the south, bordered by Syria, Iraq, Iran, Armenia, and Georgia. Together, they live a shared life of prayer, hospitality, and mission to a small but vibrant and international community of Iraqi and Iranian refugee families awaiting resettlement, African university students and local Christians and catechumens preparing for baptism. It is indeed a mission far away from home and in a strange land. But Donato wrote that despite the challenges he was "filled with a quiet conviction that Mary's hand was gently guiding and her presence is tangible here: behind the altar stands a striking statue of Our Lady of Sorrows, and above the sanctuary, the ceiling bears a powerful Latin inscription: "Gemitus Matris Tuae ne Obliviscaris" — "Do not forget your Mother's sorrow." As a Marist, these words moved me deeply. They echoed our call to share in Mary's compassionate gaze—to see the pain of our world and respond with tender, courageous presence".
