

CELEBRATING ST. PETER CHANEL'S FEAST DAY AND 158th ANNIVERSARY OF 'APIFO'OU COLLEGE

On the 6th May, the students and ex-scholars of 'Apifo'ou College in Tonga celebrated the Feast of St. Peter Chanel, the patron saint of the college together with its 158th Anniversary. 'Apifo'ou College traces its origin to 1865 when Fr. Jean-Amand Lamaze SM founded an all-boys day school named St. Stanislaus College which later became St. Peter Chanel on 15th August 1886. The Principal, Fr. 'Ekuasi led the celebration of the Holy Eucharist and joined by the Marists and Diocesan clergies at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. The school band then led the marching to the school hall for the second part of the celebration which was a choir competition and the donations of annual levy for the upkeep of the college. According to 'Ekuasi 'it was wonderful to see older generations blending joyfully with the younger ones.''
