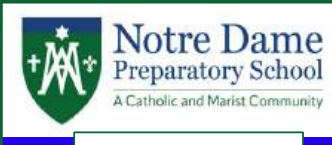

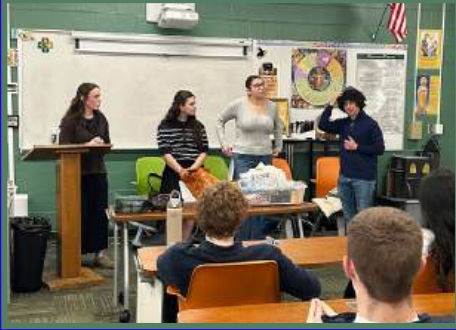
## Irish Week 2026
